LEWIS DOUBLE.

Saturday the club conducted a 20-mile handicap race, Old Buffers' race. Both races were won by members of the Lewis Double.

20-MILE RACE.

Race was for a cup presented by Dunstan, and the course was of the five mile circuit. Out of 15 entries only eleven faced the start, and owing to withdrawals the race was shifted from 2 min. out to 3 min. As soon as the race was set off, R. Judd and I. Lewis (scratch) set a merry pace and like reaching the front of the race.

On the first time around, R. Mulvaney (3 min.) had retired with a chain, and L. Woodward (3 min.) had punctured and also retired. The first lap was the work of H. Spence and A. Gray (scratch) who, instead of gaining on the other riders, W. Treloar, R. Judd and K. Gormley, had lost a minute to them, and the scratch had gained a minute.

After the second lap R. Judd and Lewis (scratch) reached the front of the field and lead for the rest of the race.

In the final sprint I. Lewis beat R. Judd by an inch, with W. Treloar (4 min.) third. Result:—Lewis (scratch) 1; Roy Judd (4 min.) 2; W. Treloar (4 min.) 3.

MOTOR CYCLE USED ILLEGALLY

TWO MEN FINED.

A journey from Chelsea to Mentone, which would have cost each of two young men a few pence on the railway, cost one of them £8/0/6 and the other £5 10/6 because they decided upon the modern method of travel by road—but on another person's motor-cycle.

At the Chelsea Court on Monday, before Messrs. D. Bowman and W. Stephens, J.L.P., Alan George Green, of Carrum, pleaded guilty to a charge of having ridden a motor-cycle on September 4 when not in possession of a current driver's license.

Green and Keith Hornsey, of Barnes grove, Chelsea, both pleaded guilty to charges of having used a motor-cycle on September 4 without the consent of the owner. Inspector Stanley appeared to prosecute.

Alan Shine, butcher, of Station street, Chelsea, gave evidence that he left his motor-cycle outside a tea room in Chelsea. When he came out again the motor-cycle was gone. Two men told him that they knew who rode the cycle away. He went with the police to Mentone, where he saw Green and Hornsey. Green called him aside and promised to "make it sweet for him."

First-constable Gilding said that he went to Mentone with First-constable Rennie and Shine and saw Shine's motor-cycle outside a dance hall. They saw Green and Hornsey leave the dance hall and walk towards the cycle. They then looked toward the car in which he was seated and began to walk away. When questioned they declared that they had travelled to Mentone from Chelsea by train.

Green, who admitted three previous convictions on charges of larceny, was fined 10/- for having ridden a motor-cycle without a license. For having used the motor-cycle illegally he was fined £7, with 10/6 costs. Hornsey was fined £5, with 10/6 costs. A stay of 28 days was granted.

HIGH SPEED

MOTORIST FINED £2.

The plea of Ernest James Chambers that he was hurrying to take a passenger in his car to see her mother who was very ill at Frankston evidently aroused the sympathy of the Bench at Chelsea Court on Monday when Chambers was fined £2 on a charge of having driven a motor-car at a speed dangerous to the public.

A member of the police traffic patrol gave evidence that he followed a car driven by Chambers for about 13 miles from a point near Bonbeach. For a mile before Seaford was reached the speed of the car was from 68 m.p.h. to 70 m.p.h. Through Seaford the speed was 50 m.p.h., but rose again to between 58 and 60 m.p.h. after passing Seaford.

Chambers said that the speedometer on his car was not working. He did not think his car was travelling at such a high speed, but the constable should know better than he. He said that a girl had come to his home and said that her mother was very ill at Frankston and he volunteered to drive her there to see her.
